Subject: Annual Administrative Review of Traffic Stops

This review is provided in accordance with General Order 2.06 – Bias Based Profiling and the Commission for Law Enforcement Accreditation standard 2.06 Bullet E. Information documented in this report was derived from the research of agency traffic stop data, traffic citations/warnings, arrests, and the U.S. Census Bureau.

Research of data for deputies involved in traffic stops, traffic warnings, traffic citations, and arrests were determined to be unremarkable except for the disparity between the percentage of citations and warnings issues to Hispanic/Latino drivers during traffic stops. The review of the data is as follows:

The above numbers generated a question about the rate of which Hispanic/Latino drivers were issued traffic citations in relation to the number of warnings they were given. The data listed below explains this disparity. Nearly one third of all citations issued to Hispanic/Latino drivers were for driving without ever having received a driver license. This is a criminal citation and much less likely to be handled by issuing a warning.

There were five documented citizen complaints wherein vehicle drivers asserted they were stopped because of their race and/or to be harassed. Thorough investigations and body worn camera videos of the traffic stops showed four of the complaints were unfounded or exonerated. One complaint was not sustained for the deputy's treatment of the driver, but the investigation led to other sustained policy violations.

A review of General Orders 2.06 – Bias Based Profiling and 22.01 – Traffic law Enforcement found them to be in compliance with Florida Statutes.
